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The 2010/2011 [Passport to the Arts](#) offers a 50 percent discount on admission to 48 Cape Cod theaters, museums, historical sites, and performances. Now in its seventh year, the Passport to the Arts has evolved from a small group of eight organizations to its current roster of 48 cultural organizations, representing the very best of the arts and culture of Cape Cod.

The passport is a beautifully designed, souvenir-quality booklet with information about each participating organization.

Passport holders will be able to receive a 50 percent discount on admission to select events at each participating venue once during the course of the year. Each member venue sets its own restrictions and rules of use, so passport holders must call venues in advance to ensure availability.

The Passport to the Arts, which is produced by the [Arts Foundation of Cape Cod](#), is available for purchase online at www.artsfoundation.org or by calling the Arts Foundation at 508-362-0066. Each passport costs \$20, and the 2010 passport will be valid through May 2012.

With admission to participating venues running from \$5 to \$8, passport holders will reap savings by visiting just four or five of the 48 participants. Some of my favorites (with regular admission in parentheses) are:

- The [Cahoon Museum of American Art](#) in Cotuit (\$5), where you can see the whimsical mermaid paintings of Ralph Cahoon along with a nice sampling of American artists.
- The [Cape Cod Museum of Art](#) in Dennis (\$8), which has an outstanding collection of Cape Cod artists.
- The [Sandwich Glass Museum](#) (\$5), with its incomparable collection of nearly 5,000 pieces of glass produced at the Boston & Sandwich Glass Company between 1825 and 1888, and the opportunity to watch a glass blower at work.
- The [Pilgrim Monument and Provincetown Museum](#) (\$7), which this year is celebrating the 100th anniversary of the dedication of the monument.

There are also theaters, musical performances, and attractions for children.

If you want to experience the full range of Cape Cod cultural attractions, the Passport to the Arts is the real deal.

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
